Celebrating a third successful year of Career Club! By Rebecca Cole

This Spring semester was the third year of the Career Club, a program collaboration of GBCI, the ACES (Achieving Collegiate Excellence and Success) Program and Link Generations. The Career Club involves high school students throughout Montgomery County and adult volunteers from AMV and the Gaithersburg community in one-hour conversations every two weeks for the duration of the Spring semester. It is Zoom-based and organized by ACES—a program of Montgomery County Public Schools, Montgomery College and the Universities at Shady Grove that offers high school juniors and seniors a supportive pathway to a bachelor's degree. The students are often the first in their families to plan to attend college.



Students and Volunteers create a web at the Career Club celebration. Each person was invited to toss a ball of yarn to someone in the circle and offer them words of affirmation about something they learned from them or appreciated about them in the Career Club. The yarn quickly became a web filled with encouraging, positive, inspiring words reminding us that we are connected, encouraged, and that we have a community to lean on and support us through all phases of life.

After a semester of sessions on Zoom, this year the Career Club

experienced a positive change: students and volunteers were DELIGHTED to have the last session together IN PERSON! The ACES team planned & hosted an engaging end of program event at Montgomery College for Career Club students and volunteers. It was a joyous time for volunteers and students to connect, share learnings from participating in the program, and celebrate a wonderful semester!



Afghan Refugee Update

There is very good news around the Afghan families. We now have 11 families that **NNIA** (New **N**eighbor Interfaith **A**lliance) is assisting here in the Gaithersburg/Rockville area. Two new families have come via the southern border without anything at all including work documents. About 50 Afghans are currently being helped by NNIA groups of "neighbors" and assorted friends. We have found some new jobs including as teachers, caterers, and a pharmacist.

Our amazing Afghan journalist, Naqib Arwen, has started a 30-page monthly newspaper to service the Farsi speaking community in North America. Copies are now available from Candy Warner. Copies are free as, hopefully, advertising will subsidize the effort. Education and language lessons continue to be a priority for everyone.

Food Distribution Efforts in Greater Gaithersburg By Frank Lostumbo

The GBCI Monthly Meeting on March 17, 2023, featured an in-depth discussion of food distribution efforts in greater Gaithersburg.



Guests included **Pastor Jennifer Fenner**, *Epworth United Methodist Church*, **Patrick Donohue**, *the Lords Table*, **Agar Mbianda**, *Community Engagement Manager*, *MANNA Food Center*, and **Jenna Umbriac**, *Director of Policy and Programs, Manna Food Center*. Frank Lostumbo, GBCI Food Program Coordinator provided a brief overview of the local community partnerships involved in the food program and the evolving challenges for the future.

Since the COVID Pandemic began, GBCI works in collaboration with Epworth UMC, the Lord's Table, Safe Places Resident's Association, and other community partners to address the food insecurity in the neighboring communities. Epworth church has served as a distribution center and resource hub serving over 300 families weekly. The GBCI volunteer drivers have made weekly deliveries to the Safe Places Team at Cider Mill Apartments where 70 families received a week's supply of food. Sources of food were plentiful and included the Honduran Embassy, Gaithersburg HELP, Singh Foundation, Islamic Community of MD (ICM) and city and county sources including MANNA.

Last fall, the USDA cutback their food allocations to each state, and that impacted state, county, and city supplies. The neighborhood food distribution was reduced from weekly to biweekly for 200 families, causing the GBCI driving team to now deliver food boxes on alternate Sunday for 52 families at Cider Mill, where Safe Places distributes food to each family.

During the discussions panelists and guests shared lessons and experiences of how food insecurity issues were addressed over the course of the pandemic and how current changes in federal support are challenging for many local families who are impacted daily by food insecurity and the challenges of pandemic recovery. Most agreed that the federal government has the greatest responsibility to decrease food insecurity in the US. While the support from Montgomery County and the city is positive, there are limits to what they can do and rely on many volunteer efforts from the non-profit and religious entities that have tried to fill in the gaps.

Their sharing revealed problems that are more systemic and go well beyond food issues—problems from health conditions, rental increases, unsuitable habitats, and safety issues. These inequities present growing gaps between those at different ends of the income spectrum and the level of services they receive. Their insights demonstrate the daily living challenges among larger numbers of people experiencing not only food insecurity but economic instability pressures as well. This has a ripple effect to the entirety of our economy and the whole of society. These issues can no longer be ignored and building an inclusive recovery will be far more challenging than simply returning to pre pandemic norms. We must all work together and raise our common voices to influence change for our current community and future generations.


