What is GBCI?

The Gaithersburg Beloved Community Initiative (GBCI) is a nonprofit that nurtures intergenerational relationships and promotes social justice through programs with youth, families, and older adults in the city of Gaithersburg. Created by residents at Asbury Methodist Village (AMV), GBCI's goal is to realize Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s vision of a "beloved community," where individuals from diverse backgrounds can have equal opportunities to live healthy, fulfilling lives. Our volunteer-led programs cover early education literacy and art programs, mentorship, English conversation classes, and more. Together we collaborate with residents at Asbury, community partners, and passionate individuals in Gaithersburg to create better outcomes for marginalized communities. GBCI's offices are located at Asbury Methodist Village.

Perhaps the biggest one is a caring/loving heart for kids. Are you willing to actively listen? Can you encourage students when you see talents and personality traits that will carry them far in life? Can you use questions to encourage them to see other options if things are not working out? If you are answering yes, then you should be a mentor.... Last year I found real joy in watching the students have fun, grow, and mature, and I felt like both the students and mentors truly become a part of a very important community."

Before wrapping up the meeting, audience members did a fun collaborative activity where they shared family traditions with the person sitting next to them. This was a great opportunity for new residents to learn about members of their community and a great example of how our program volunteers use conversation to build relationships with our participants. Native Meadow Expansion at Asbury with Common Ground Earth



Did you know that a small reduction in lawn mowing frequency can bring several environmental benefits such as reducing greenhouse gases, sustaining ecosystems, and increasing overall biodiversity? Common Ground Earth is a nonprofit organization (NPO) working with other NPOs such as schools, churches, and retirement communities as well as businesses, and individuals in Montgomery County to promote sustainable practices and the adaptation of nature-based solutions in everyday life. One of their most popular sustainable solutions is the implementation of native meadows in lieu of maintained lawns. Native meadows provide habitats consisting of native plants like grasses, wildflowers, herbs, and other non-woody

plants native to the Mid-Atlantic/Gaithersburg area. This brings several advantages such as improved storm management, habitats for wildlife, and increased resilience to pests. Native meadows are also cost-effective, require little to no fertilizer and pesticide use, and produce less pollution (air emissions and noise from combustible engines reduced) compared to manicured lawns. We are excited to be part of the Asbury Foundation's partnership with Common Ground Earth in a community outreach project to convert lawns to native meadows on Asbury Methodist Village's campus. Through a grant provided by the Chesapeake Bay Trust, over the next year, the Asbury Team is converting 1.6 acres of lawn to native meadows. These changes can be seen on the corner parcel at Odendhal Avenue and Russel Avenue, and the hillside in the Nature Preserve. Through efforts like these, Asbury can maintain their status as a certified arboretum with 134 acres for wildlife and foliage while also doing their part in optimizing operations to lower cost and their impact on the environment. We are grateful for the Chesapeake Bay Trust's support in helping us maintain an eco-friendly campus.
