What is GBCI?

The Gaithersburg Beloved Community Initiative (GBCI) is a nonprofit that nurtures intergenerational relationships and promotes social justice through programs with youth, families, and older adults in the city of Gaithersburg. Created by residents at Asbury Methodist Village (AMV), GBCI's goal is to realize Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s vision of a "beloved community," where individuals from diverse backgrounds can have equal opportunities to live healthy, fulfilling lives. Our volunteer-led programs cover early education literacy and art programs, mentorship, English conversation classes, and more. Together we collaborate with residents at Asbury, community partners, and passionate individuals in Gaithersburg to create better outcomes for marginalized communities. GBCI's offices are located at Asbury Methodist Village.

A Day of Connection and Culture at GBCI's Community Day

My name is Georgia Portocarrero, and I have volunteered at the registration table at GBCI's annual Community Day for three years. Community Day is an annual event where Asbury residents, community members, and GBCI partners gather to enjoy games, food, and educational activities while creating meaningful connections. This year the job was especially poignant for me for several reasons. Helping participants register for the event provided an opportunity to appreciate the diversity of our community. As I welcomed neighbors from Middle Eastern, African, Central and South American countries, as well as neighbors from AMV, I interacted with people who spoke a variety of languages and who represented many different cultural traditions. Volunteers representing various

community organizations and church groups provided important support for this event.

Watching families from different cultures share a meal, enjoy entertainment, and interact with one another reinforced the value of living in Gaithersburg, one of the most diverse cities in the U.S.. A resident at Asbury Methodist Village commented on the growth of GBCI's Community Day, saying "It was great to see the community participate, particularly the off-campus community, and to see the growth since last year"

This year I was especially moved by the attendance of several current and former students from the GBCI English Conversation Group that I have been working with for the past nine years. Many of these women belong to Mujer Fuerza y Coraje, (Strong and Courageous Women) a non-profit group, organized by Milagro Flores, that supports Latino women and families in the area. They were not only at the event to congratulate Mily, who received special recognition from GBCI for her more than 12-year collaboration with the organization, but also to promote Mujer Fuerza y Coraje and community activism. I have watched these women grow over the years from being very shy and speaking almost no English, to women who are confident, and comfortable expressing themselves in English, and who are now active participants in GBCI and the community. They provide a strong support system, especially for Latino families, and enjoy being part of GBCI and the AMV community.

These women are wonderful role models for their children, many of whom accompanied them to this event. Some of the children volunteered to help with the games, others provided entertainment as members of De Colores, a local Gaithersburg Mexican folk-dance group. One proud mother has four



children who are in the dance troupe. My husband Cesar, who also volunteered at the event, was able to reconnect with some of his former mentees from Gaithersburg Elementary School. GBCl's Community Day has been a great success and provides a wonderful opportunity for AMV residents to experience a wider sense of community by meeting our Gaithersburg neighbors.

Exploring The Importance of Emotions in the Intergenerational Book Club by Natasha Kalitsi




What would you do if you could no longer feel? This month, the Intergenerational Book Club explored sadness, avoidance, and emotional processing in the graphic novel "The Faint of Heart" by Kerilynn Wilson. This story is set in a world where a celebrated scientist has discovered how to make emotions like sadness, anxiety, and anger disappear—removing your heart! Almost everyone in town has decided to remove their hearts, placing them in a numbing solution where all their emotions, even the good ones, are suppressed. All except for a high school student named June. June remains adamant about keeping her heart and mourns the time she spent with her friends and family before their procedure. One day June finds an abandoned heart in a jar on her way home. This story follows June as she helps her sister, and her classmate Max get their emotions back.

The Intergenerational Book club is a partnership between GBCI, Asbury, Gaithersburg Library, and Link Generations that brings together older adults and middle and high school students to discuss topics and themes that they read in the monthly book selection. The October session offered an interesting discussion on the themes present in the graphic novel, "The Faint of Heart." Many participants noted that while the townspeople and the scenery were all in black and white, June was the only character with color in her design. Characters and objects that reflect emotion were drawn in color, highlighting the intensity of the emotions portrayed in the scene. Then the group questioned whether it was better to have emotions or to not have any at all. Most participants agreed that it was better to have your emotions and process through difficult ones so that you can learn from them and become stronger. Participants also had an introspective discussion about whether they were more sensitive or stoic. Some participants leaned more towards stoicism, saying they tend to think more logically than emotionally. Some adult volunteers shared they were originally more stoic but after going through life experiences like having children they became more sensitive.

Overall, the main message that the group learned was to not run from your emotions, and that challenging moments can get better with time. The discussion fostered deep reflection on the value of embracing emotions and underscored the importance of growth through emotional experiences, a message that resonated with participants of all ages. The Intergenerational Book Club meets monthly at the Gaithersburg Library. The next session is November 19 at 6:30pm, all are welcome!
