As the day winds down and the week stretches ahead, the students gather in a circle, forming a bond that transcends the classroom. They take turns, each one saying those heartfelt words, "From my heart to yours...", followed by a wish for the group until they meet again the following week. In those moments, thoughts of love, creativity, and hope are shared freely,



creating a sense of warmth and connection that fills the room.

We decided to spread our love to three groups of people in the month of February: the residents of Wilson Health Care Center, our dedicated schoolteachers, and the often-overlooked school building service staff.

Waiting eagerly in the dark with their mentors, the team arrived, the lights flicked on, and the students emerged from their hiding spots, shouting, "Thank you for all you do!" Exploring Art with Students: A Mentor's Perspective By Barbara Kilby

Every Thursday afternoon, I ride the Asbury Village bus to the Gaithersburg elementary school with a few other GBCI volunteer Art Mentors. We wait in the school office until 3:30, when school is out and we can make our way to the art room. It's like swimming upriver: students who are going



home stream toward us on both sides of the hall, with enormous backpacks over their shoulders, and we thread our way between the ranks, up the ramp to Room Six. I like to catch a smile from some of them when I wave and say Hi. and once a

boy said, "Hello, Grandma," as he passed me.

In the classroom, we find seats and the students help distribute our individual journals and art supplies. Then we

get a suggested prompt for our journal entries, such as, "If you had an Avatar, what animal would it be?" And almost all of the fifth and sixth graders know a video game or a movie with an Avatar in it, so they know what that means. Or, "Draw a picture of your favorite kind of day." One of the staff will translate the prompt into Spanish for kids who are not yet fluent in English. After we draw in our journals, each participant can show his or her own drawing and comment on it. Although it's okay to opt out, it's rare for a student to do so; they are proud of their art and their interpretations.



The main project of the day usually introduces something novel, such as a special medium like oil pastels or modeling clay. Regardless of whether it's their first time, the students always dive right into a new project.

As Mentors, we interact with the students, suggesting, encouraging, and asking helpful questions, but not really teaching Art. So it surprised me when a boy sitting next to me kept asking things like, "Miss Barbara, how would you draw a campfire?" Then he got specific, asking, "How would you draw the logs? What about the flames? And down here, what should I draw underneath the logs?" The

result of that exchange was that we both drew campfires, absolutely not identical, but very satisfying to each of us.

I am certain that all the Mentors were surprised and touched when one day — the students must have planned this — a bunch of them came into the school office where we were waiting before class, and hugged the Mentors, one by one, to say hello. This is an intergenerational program, for sure. And the kids know how to run it.
